In 1994 when I first joined EDFAS (Eastbourne Decorative and Fine Arts Society), we met at St John's Church Parish Hall in Eastbourne which had its limitations. This was happily resolved in 2002 when the Committee did a tour of all the local halls; much to our delight, East Dean Village Hall fulfilled all the criteria and has been home to us ever since.

Eastbourne – the Suntrap of the South – was the venue for the NADFAS Annual General Meeting and Conference in 2004. Being the 'home team' our Society was heavily involved with its planning and the running of the three-day event: a mayoral reception, dinner in the Winter Garden, coach trips all over Sussex and the AGM in the Congress Theatre meant it is still talked about.

We continue to be served by dedicated Committee members who, with the help of volunteers, ensure the smooth running of lecture days. Our technical teams have come a long way from operating temperamental slide projectors; today's technical know-how greatly enhances our enjoyment. Visits, Holidays and Special Interest Days have always been popular, and the philanthropic scope of the Society has developed, with the money raised on the monthly raffle adding to the amount we donate to local arts-related projects.

CHARITABLE PROJECTS

An important part of our society's ethos is that we support local arts-based organisations however we can. This is embedded in our constitution, which describes our objects as the "advancement of the aesthetic education of the public, the cultivation, appreciation and study of the decorative and fine arts, and the giving of aid to the preservation of our national artistic heritage"

One way we do this is that, each year, we make some grants to local arts-based organisations out of our reserves. The Arts Society very much encourages this, and makes an annual grant of £250 available for precisely this purpose. In addition, this year we added a further £1,750 out of our own reserves. I thought you might like to know how we used this money.

The largest donation we made this year was £750 to the **Towner 100 Community Appeal**. You'll all be well aware of the Towner, Eastbourne's iconic and renowned art gallery, but you may be less aware of great work they do (but can only do with the community's help) with young people, those with mental health diagnoses and those who are resident in the more deprived parts of town. Our next largest donation was to **Holy Trinity Arts**, a group on Seaside Road which runs arts workshops for all interested adults, and there are plans to run further workshops for mums and younger children. All faiths and none are welcome and the group reaches out to some of the hard-to-reach in our community. It's quiet, gentle and effective, and the money is needed to buy, amongst other things: easels, canvases, brushes, paints and re-usable floor coverings, to protect the carpet in the hall where the group meets.

The next organisation we decided to support, with a donation of £275, is one that you may be familiar with. It is **Compass Community Arts**, an Eastbourne-based charity which describes itself as "an intergenerational, co-creative, artist led organisation for anyone vulnerable to social isolation, lived trauma, mental illness and hidden disabilities". This is the second year we have supported Compass Arts, which continues to do wonderful work in and around the town. Our final two donations were both specifically student-related. The first was a donation of £225 to sponsor the **Eastbourne Rotary Schools Art** competition. The second was a donation of £250 to fund The Arts Society Eastbourne Student Prize for another year at **West Dean College** – which, as you'll have seen elsewhere in this newsletter, you have the opportunity to visit this summer, at their Open Day on 3rd July!

Patrick's talk began with a film of his recent Palm Sunday and all the clergy and choristers processing and singing around the outside and into St Pauls Cathedral. Our attention then switched to Jerusalem and we heard two differing and very beautiful Hosannas. Patrick sang an excerpt from Handel's Messiah followed by the St Pauls Choir singing music by John Rutter

Good Friday laments followed with a historic recording by Jessye Norman singing a very poignant "were you there". Miserere – a psalm in which mercy is sought especially Psalm 51 or the music written for it. We heard many beautiful and various miserere by Allegri, Raj and Byrd also Purcell's 'Hear my Prayer" and the St Paul's Choir singing the 51st Psalm. As we come to the end of Good Friday darkness descends and Jesus' life is coming to the end.

Stabat Mater. Our attention is now focused on the Cross and the music of Good Friday. Patrick sang some more beautiful choral music. Christ has been taken down from the cross and stripped of his garments. We are shown some truly beautiful pictures and sculptures of Mary cradling Jesus in her arms with such suffering ,love and tenderness. The lectures ended with a video of Patrick,having been given permission to enter a deserted San Marco Basilica Venice and he sang a Sabat Mater by Vivaldi with his truly beautiful voice matched only by the splendour of San Marco itself. The clip finished with Patrick standing with a beautific smile on his face.

A memorable ending to a thought provoking series of lectures. There were many wonderful psalms sung and music played, as was well as paintings and sculpture shown too numerous to mention in this review. Patrick gave us a very special day. He is a truly gifted singer and an accomplished lecturer and we all came away in a very reflective but uplifted mood.

Victoria Baptist Church is a new venue for the Art Society and proved to be very apt considering the subject matter and the lectures taking place in the chapel itself. The building is very

well appointed with plenty of spacious rooms and facilities. A big thank you must go to the committee and volunteers for all their hard work making sure the day ran smoothly and serving us with such a delicious lunch of sandwiches and a choice of THREE cakes.
