LECTURE PROGRAMME 2023-2024

Tuesday 10 October 2023: Frank Woodgate Everything is Art, Everything is politics (Ai WeiWei)

This lecture will examine the provocative and often beautiful work of the Chinese artist Ai Weiwei in the context of dissident art in China, Europe and South America, and examine some of his sources of inspiration, including the Russian Constructivist, Vladimir Tatlin, and the leading Dada artist, Marcel Duchamp.



Tuesday 14 November 2023: Rosamund Bartlett *The Culture of Ukraine*



This lecture tells the multifaceted Ukrainian story through the shared culture which binds its diverse people together, including the sacred art and architecture of Kyiv inherited from Byzantium, the rich legacy of the Cossacks, and a treasury of poetry, painting and song. We will also look at the key role played by folk culture in the

years before Ukraine's emergence as an independent nation.

Tuesday 12 December 2023: Bertie Pierce *The Dickens of a Christmas*

Dickens revived the Christmas traditions with his warm portrayal of Christmas in the domestic setting: plum pudding, turkey, games, dancing and family cheer by the hearth. Dickens was a man of extraordinary energy and talent: literary genius, reformer, public speaker, actor and amateur



magician. In his lecture Bertie Pearce reveals a true Dickensian Christmas.

Tuesday 9 January 2024: John Sillevis Macchiaioli - Pre-Impressionist Movement in Italy

The Macchiaioli were a group of Italian painters active in Tuscany in the second half of the nineteenth century. They strayed from antiquated conventions taught by the Italian art academies, and did much of their painting outdoors in order to capture natural light, shade, and colour. The movement originated with a small group of artists,



many of whom had been revolutionaries in the uprisings of 1848. The artists met regularly at the Caffè Michelangelo in Florence to discuss art and politics. These idealistic young men, dissatisfied with the art of the academies, shared a wish to reinvigorate Italian art by emulating the bold tonal structure they admired in such old masters as Rembrandt, Caravaggio and Tintoretto.

Tuesday 13 February 2024: Rupert Willoughby Cool Marble! The Essential Guide to Greek Sculpture



The Ancient Greeks invented the human portrait and their sculpture formed the basis of European art. Arguably, it has never been bettered. They produced statues of such beauty and realism that men are said to have fallen in love with them. A Classical scholar and teacher, Rupert elucidates some of their finest artistic expressions. including the

controversial Parthenon or 'Elgin' marbles (the story of which is recounted in detail) and the Venus di Milo, celebrated survivor of a craze for 'naked Aphrodites'. Here is a chance to meet the Ancient Greeks in the raw. Contains nudity!

Tuesday 12 March 2024: Lucia Gahlin Wonderful Things - Tutankhamun: The Boy King, his Tomb and Treasures

In 2022 the centenary of the excavation of Tutankhamun's tomb by Howard Carter in 1922 was celebrated. In this lecture Lucia explores the design and decoration of the most famous tomb in the Valley of the Kings; she discusses its discovery and the incredible finds sealed within.



Tuesday 9 April 2024: Jacqueline Cockburn Fantasy Comes from Ghosts: Gaudi and Other Catalan Architects



Antoni Gaudí is well known and much loved. In this lecture, his work will be explored in detail. It will be shown how he engaged with nature and we will look at his public and private buildings and his

relationship with a wealthy and demanding patron. Private shy and retiring he was also humorous and witty in his extravagant style.

Tuesday 14 May 2024: Sarah Burles Lord Fitzwilliam and his Bequest to Cambridge

The Fitzwilliam Museum in Cambridge was founded on the death of Richard, 7th Viscount Fitzwilliam in 1816. Who was Lord Fitzwilliam? What is his connection to The Netherlands?



How did he acquire his extensive collection and what prompted him to leave it to the University of Cambridge? These, and many other questions, will be answered in a lecture that will also discuss some of the key works in Lord Fitzwilliam's bequest.
