THE FORENSIC EYE

with Dr Chantal Brotherton-Ratcliffe

Following her very well received lecture on *Raphael* to the Arts Society Brighton & Hove in October 2023, Dr. Chantal Brotherton-Ratcliffe returns to the Brighthelm Centre for a much anticipated study day.

How do dealers, auctioneers and museum staff determine whether a piece is by one painter or another? What role does the signature play, and what are the key clues to look for when deciding who painted the picture? And how can we be sure that what we see on the wall in front of us is the painting the artist produced? Damage, alterations and downright forgeries are all things we need to recognise and take into consideration.

In this study day, we consider clues, weigh up their relative usefulness, and learn some of the tricks of the connoisseur. The day ends with a chance to try out your skills, identifying artists and oddities in "spot the artist".

Lecture 1 Looking with the Eyes Wide Open

We can stand for minutes in front of a painting and think we are seeing it, but how much have we actually noticed? How much more could we take in if we have a mental check list of things to look for, if we know how to know what is significant to notice. In this first session, we will consider many of the basic stylistic features of a painting, from colouring to the uses of lighting, to analyse how different artists tend to use them at different times and in different art centres Do we ever notice any technical aspects of the piece – is it on canvas or on panel, for instance, - and does it matter? What can an awareness of the pigments used, or the artist's choice of ground colour, tell us about where and when something was painted?

Lecture 2 Tricks, Tips and Trip-Ups

In the second lecture, we will look at various forms of deception. We will ask whether we are seeing what the artist produced, or whether time, or later human intervention, has altered it. We will also look at paintings that they would have us believe are by one artist, but which are produced by workshop assistants, later admirers, or downright forgers. Determining the difference between forgery, copy and original is one of the most difficult areas of the art world. Chantal will involve the audience in spotting oddities, distinguishing copyists and identifying forgeries.

Lecture 3: Finding your Inner Connoisseur

The first two talks will have looked at a number of physical and stylistic features that make it possible for us to identify date, place of production and art background of an artist. This final talk will examine a specific group of artists, and give you a chance to try out your budding connoisseurial skills of recognition.

Your Lecturer

Chantal Brotherton-Ratcliffe started her career by training as a paintings conservator, and then moved into art history, working for Sotheby's. She has been a lecturer in Old Master Paintings at Sotheby's Institute of Art for over 30 years. She has also lectured for a number of institutions in London and elsewhere, including the National Gallery, the Royal Academy, the Wallace Collection and the Arts Society. Her particular interest is in demonstrating how to analyse the subtle stylistic features of a painting that might tell us who the artist is, and when a painting is a copy, good or bad.
